

Hills police are honored

FARMINGTON HILLS—Merit citations and letters of commendation have been awarded to seven Farmington Hills police officers for the roles they played in closing up a number of crimes in the Farmington Hills area.

Merit Citations were awarded to Sgt. Gordon Ross, Wayne Johnston, and William Hoeft.

On March 6, 1974, the three men apprehended three burglars on Harwell street which resulted in the closing of approximately 20 breaking and enterings of residences in the area.

Hoeft is no longer with the Hills police department.

Sgt. Mirl Spencer received a Letter of Commendation for his investigation of a breaking and entering at Highmeadow Elementary school, which resulted in the arrest of six juveniles and the closing up of 15 cases of

breaking and entering.

Spencer and Officer Charles Archambeau received letters of commendation for their investigation of breaking and enterings along the Grand River business district area during Jan., 1974.

Their investigation resulted in the arrest of one juvenile and the closing of 45 breaking and entering cases, seven attempted breaking and entering cases, three malicious destruction of property complaints, six unlawful driving away of an automobile complaints, and the recovery of \$20,300 in stolen property.

Officer Dennis Rochford and Officer Gerald Lynch received citations for their apprehension of a felon and the recovery of money stolen from Brenners market on June 2, 1974.

The men received the citations during a ceremony in Director Ronald Holko's office Thursday morning.

Narcotics link sought in killing

FARMINGTON HILLS—The man whose body was found in Farmington Hills last week was apparently killed because he owed somebody money from a dope bag he was supposed to

sell, according to the Hills police.

The police said it is their opinion that Dennis Leroy Wallace, 28, of Detroit, was killed because he was \$225 short of the money he was supposed to turn in from a \$500 dope bag.

The police said they have determined his connection with the dope ring by talking to certain people during their investigation.

Wallace's body was found in the front yard of a Farmington Hills resident, Edgar Fredericks, 28351 W. 14 Mile Rd. last Tuesday.

Fredericks said he saw the body as he was driving out of his driveway on his way to work in the morning. He said he immediately returned to the house and called the police.

When he called the police he was under the impression that there were two bodies. However, one was just a bundle of clothes and towels which had been dumped next to Wallace's body.

According to the Hills police the man had been shot at least once in the right side of the head.

The police are still conducting an investigation into the case.

Adult education classes offered

FARMINGTON—Off-Campus classes will begin Sept. 28 at the Farmington Center for Lifelong Learning and Human Development located at 27500 Farmington Road.

The John Wesley College Center for Continuing Education in Owosso is sponsoring the classes in connection with the Metropolitan Guidance Center.

The off-campus classes give persons with full-time jobs, such as housewives, pastors, and businessmen, an opportunity to continue their education.

Eight off-campus classes have been announced for the coming session. The charge for these classes is a \$35 audit fee, for persons who wish to take the course without receiving col-

lege credit, \$55 for persons receiving two college credits, and \$75 for three credit courses.

Persons wishing to enroll for classes may do so by attending the first class session, or may assure a reservation by calling the Metropolitan Guidance Center at (313) 477-2060.

Courses being offered include, "Biblical Literature: Life of Christ," taught by Dr. Talmadge Amberson, who received his ThD from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and is pastor of Friendship Baptist Church in Lincoln Park.

Dr. Eugene Mallory will be instructing two courses: "Self-discovery Through Human Interaction," scheduled for Saturday from 9-11:30 a.m.; and "Introduction to Pastoral Coun-

selling" to be held Mondays from 1-3 p.m. Dr. Mallory received his PhD from the University of Southern California and is presently director of clinical services at Metropolitan Guidance Center.

"The Counseling Process" will be instructed by Dr. Roger Wittup who received his PhD from Western Michigan University and is a staff member at the Metropolitan Guidance Center. The class will be held on Mondays from 3:30-5 p.m.

Dr. Glenn Chaffee, Director of Metropolitan Guidance Center will be teaching the course "Theories of Personality." The class will meet on Mondays from 6-8:30 p.m.

"Meeting Emotional Needs of Children" will be taught by Kenneth Ach-

eson, who is presently a PhD candidate and a participant in the Doctoral Intern program at Metropolitan Guidance Center. The class is scheduled for Wednesdays 9-11:30 a.m.

On Tuesdays at 12:30 to 3:30 p.m. "Lamaze Natural childbirth and Baby-care," a series for non-credit, will be taught by Pat Rom. Ms. Rom is an R.N. and an experienced teacher.

"Christian Marriage and the Family" will be held on Mondays from 6-8:30 p.m. and will be instructed by Glen Good. He is also a PhD candidate in the doctoral intern program at Metropolitan Guidance Center.

The center staff will conduct the "Practicum in Pastoral Counseling" at a time to be arranged with course participants.

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
