ACCELERATED MED STUDIES

Tyner refused release

OAKLAND COUNTY—Howard Tyner, the 24-year-old Troy man, investigated for using drugs to lure teenagers into homosexual activities, will remain in prison. Tyner's attorney failed to secure his release on bond this week.

Tyner, who plead guilty to only a probation violation, had been sentenced to four to seven years in Jackson prison.

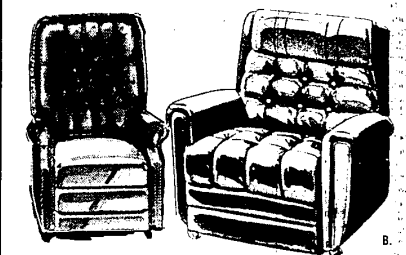
His attorney, Joel H. Schavrien, asked Circuit Court Judge Robert B. Webster Wednesday to release Tyner on bond. Schavrien said Tyner was in need of psychiatric care and would voluntarily enter an institution if released.

Schavrien said he is considering appealing his client's case. A request in Circuit Court for a new trial is a preliminary step in the appeal process.

Tyner's conviction was for violating probation terms of a previous drug-related arrest. He plead guilty to the delivery of cocaine in 1973, served 80 days in jail and was placed on three-year probation.

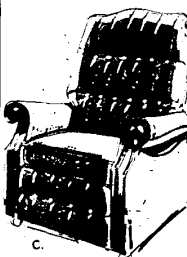
One of the conditions of that probation was that Tyner refrain from use of controlled substances.

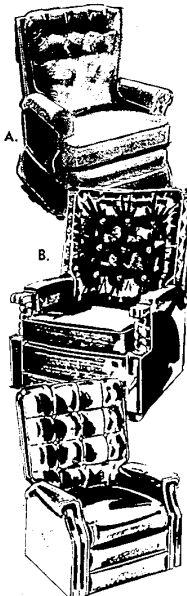

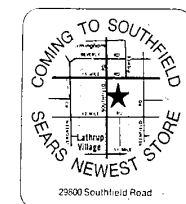
