

Cancer society fetes workers

The Oakland County Unit of the American Cancer Society celebrated its most outstanding year of fund raising and simultaneously its most outstanding volunteers at a dinner dance recently in Southfield's Shawassee Hotel.

Oakland County's contribution to the fight against cancer — \$239,000 this year — came in large measure through the Walter Hagen Golf Outing that continues to be one of the top income producing special events in the Michigan Division and is now among the top 10 fund raising golf events for charity in the United States.

The committee of men recognized with awards for the success of this event included Kenneth Janke of Birmingham and Donald Sherer and Arthur Lake, both of Troy. Janke was also given a Founder's Award, a new award initiated by the society this year to those volunteers who have headed a program which has been ongoing, or in the case of a fund raising event, has been held at least once with success and shows promise of being repeated in future years.

IDA CAVERLY was honored for initiating "Speech on the Mend," a program for the rehabilitation of the laryngectomy patient, where patients are taught to speak and are helped to resume normal lives adjusting physically, socially and mentally. She has had the operation herself.

Robert Hausman of Detroit was given the Founder's Award for establishing a program to encourage high school students to quit smoking, a program which reached hundreds of students and was successful to the point of being recognized by the National Honor Citation, the first to be given to an Oakland County resident.

Paula Heard of Farmington was honored for spearheading an annual baseball game between two teams of waitresses.

For conceiving the idea of a "Celebrity Table Tennis Tournament" which

netted the society \$3,000 this year, the Founder's Award was given to Bob Hynes and Bob Talbot.

Both men have been long associated with the society and this year Hynes served as master of ceremonies for the recognition dinner and Talbot was the guest speaker.

JASON MORTIER, a senior in Farmington High School, was given a Founder's Award for starting a Marathon Baseball Game with a few friends and little capital and a lot of energy which raised \$700 this past summer.

Helen Shaw and Edith Sidder, the two women who shared in the foundation of "Reach to Recovery," was honored with a Founder's Award. It is a program of physical, emotional and cosmetic rehabilitation for the mastectomy patient. Ms. Shaw is from Southfield and Ms. Sidder from Farmington.

For the establishment of a unique special event, a turkey shoot, for the benefit of the society, Founder's Awards were given to Leo and Carmen Tillard of Troy, who served as co-chairman for the first affair this month in cooperation with the Oakland County Sportsmen's Club.

A certificate of appreciation was given to Loraine McClish on behalf of the Observer and Eccentric Newspapers, for continuous support in promoting the fund raising activities of the society.

ANOTHER HIGHLIGHT of the affair was the selection of Miss Hope who will serve in the Cancer Crusade in the spring of 1975.

She is Monica Pasek, a resident of Troy who is a nurse in Beaumont Hospital. Her work there deals with children who have specific problems.

Talbot summed up the feelings of the American Cancer Society's directors when he quoted his favorite definition of the volunteer as "those who do what they can and then some."
