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## Close governor's race anticipated

In at least two ways, this year's race for Governor of Michigan parallels the 1970 race.

Once again, Republican William G. Milliken, the incumbent, faces Democrat Sander M. Levin. And, like 1970, a close finish is anticipated.

Each contender, however, has a new running mate. Milliken chose State Rep. James J. Damman, of Troy, and Levin chose Paul W. Brown, an attorney from Potoskey.

Following are brief biographical profiles of these four candidates and seven minor party contenders.

**SANDER M. LEVIN**, 42, of Berkley, is an attorney. He is married and father of four children.

Levin, a candidate for governor in 1970, served as state senator from 1965-1970. He was State Senate Minority Leader for two of those years.

He served three terms on the Oakland County Board of Supervisors. He is former State Democratic Chairman and former member of the National Advisory Commission on Education of Handicapped Youth.

Levin was born in Detroit and received degrees from the University of Chicago, Columbia University and the Harvard Law School.

**WILLIAM G. MILLIKEN**, 52, became governor in 1969 when former Gov. George Romney accepted a cabinet position in Washington, D.C. Milliken was elected governor in 1970.

He served four years as state senator from 1960-64 and was Majority Floor Leader the last two years of his term. As Romney's running mate, he was elected lieutenant governor in 1964 and 1966.

Milliken formerly was chairman of the Republican Governor's Association, chairman of the Upper Great Lakes Regional Commission and a member of the Executive Committee of the National Governor's Conference.

A graduate of Yale University, Milliken is a member of the Board of Counselors of Smith College, in Northampton, Mass., and served for three years as trustee of Northwestern Michigan College.

Milliken, who was born in Traverse City, is married and father of two children.

**PAUL W. BROWN**, 40, of Potoskey, is married and the father of four children. He received his law degree from the University of Michigan Law School.

He has served on the University of Michigan Board of Regents and the North Central Michigan College Board of Trustees.

**JAMES J. DAMMAN**, 41, of Troy, was first elected to the Michigan House of Representatives in 1970 and was re-elected in 1972. He served formerly as member of the Troy City Commission and the Troy Zoning Board of Appeals.

A graduate of the University of Detroit, he is married and father of six children.

**SEVEN MINOR PARTY** candidates will also be on the ballot.

## Milliken, Levin list priorities

Sander M. Levin and William G. Milliken spelled out a substantially different set of priorities in their race for voter support in the 1974 campaign for governor.

Milliken, the Republican incumbent, and Levin, the Democratic challenger, appeared in separate 90-minute interviews with The Observer & Eccentric Newspapers.

**LEVIN'S** priorities were as follows:

- Reorganize the state budget; put every department through the "hoopt", zero budget deficit.
- Enrich Michigan's economic base and help free the state from the automobile cycle dependence. Use a combination of tax incentives connected with job creation and capital investment to encourage industrial growth.
- Concentrate on the quality of education, especially for vocational and technical education and the underachiever.
- Mend the tear in the relationship between the citizen and government so that persons know whom to contact for responsive action.
- Michigan is on the short end of the federal government financial stick and Levin wants to reverse that trend.

**MILLIKEN'S** priorities are as follows:

- Implement the state's mass transportation plan, assuming it passes in the election.
- Build on the strengths of Michigan's educational system with the emphasis on quality. "We really don't know what kind of job we're doing but we presume it's poor." Be willing to take some chances, to fail, if necessary.
- Be innovative.
- Emphasize the total environment... be willing to invest public dollars in arts, museums, symphonies. "Most people are afraid of anything but meat-and-potato financing in the legislature."
- Complete the reorganization of state government.
- Concentrate on the quality of life in cities.



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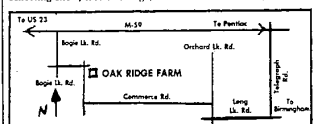
