### Women lawyers endorse judges

The Women Lawyers' Association of Michigan has endorsed selected candi-dates for judicial office in Wayne. Oxkland and Macomb counties. The association, the only statewide bar group for women attorneys in the state, established the Public Advisory formaittee (PAC) last year to screen judicial candidates and advise voters of those who have demonstrated an in-terest in advancing the cause of women in general and women in the legal profession.

PAC Chairwoman. said selections were based on the pro-fessional qualifications of candidates and their awareness of sex-based dis-crimination in all segments of society.
