Her topic will be "The Feminist Movement and Women in the Work Force."

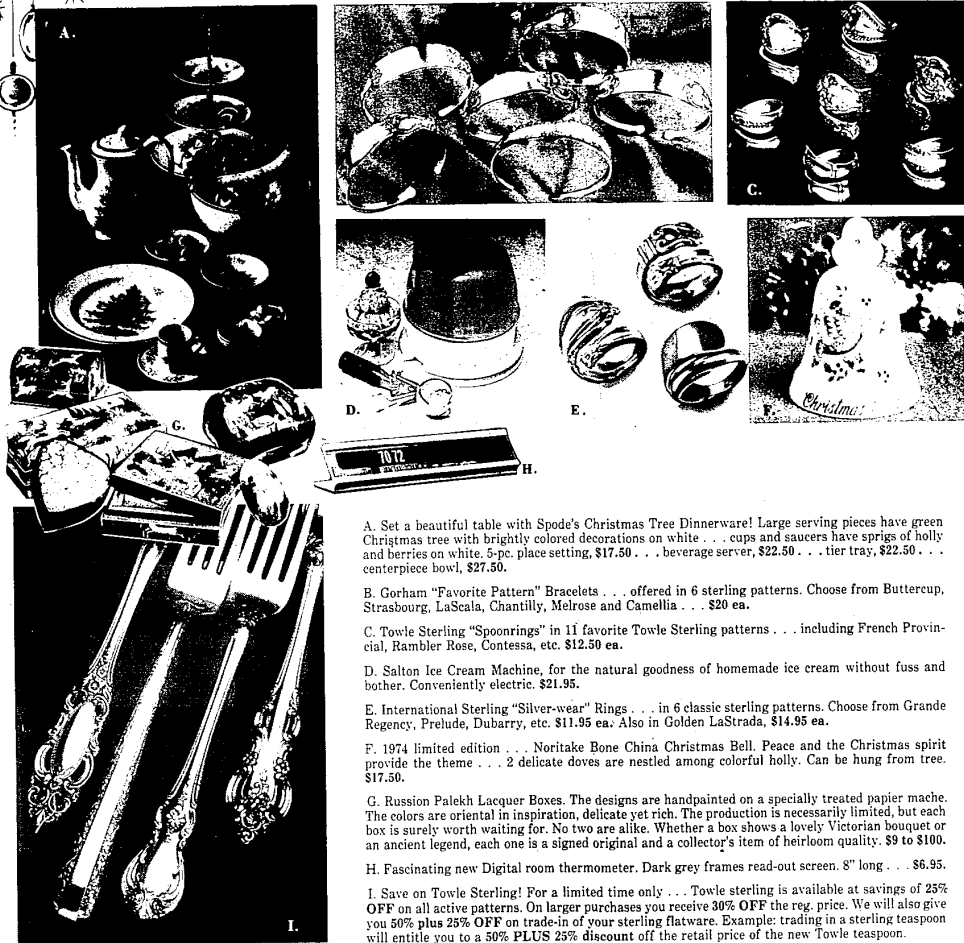
