


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Ethics code supported in 15th District race

Democrat Linda Hirschberg and Republican Lillian V. Moffitt are seeking the 15th district seat on the Oakland County Board of Commissioners in the Nov. 5 election.

The 15th district encompasses sections of Bloomfield Township, Farm-

ington Hills, Southfield and Southfield Township.

Incumbent Moffitt is seeking her second two-year term on the board and Mrs. Hirschberg is making her first bid for public office after working behind the scenes in Democratic politics for several years.

Mrs. Hirschberg, 31, said she would like to see the county "become more involved in land use problems." "More clout in the zoning role of the county is needed," she declared. "I still favor local zoning control, however."

"I'm convinced that 85 percent of the 15th district doesn't know what the County Board of Commissioners does," Mrs. Hirschberg said. "They're paid a reasonable salary and there's no reason why they can't afford to send out newsletters and make themselves more available to the public."

MRS. MOFFITT, 49, lists her primary goals on the commission as fiscal responsibility, accountability, efficiency and improved communication between the board, officials of local communities and the citizens.

Mrs. Moffitt's first resolution after election to the board in 1972 resulted in prohibiting the appointment of county commissioners to administrative posts while in office, "thus reducing the possibility of conflict of interest and use of the board as a springboard to other positions."

Mrs. Moffitt proposed and chaired a Sept. 4, 1974, mass transit symposium attended by federal, state, regional and local representatives.

Mrs. Hirschberg said she is "very interested in mass transportation. I know others have been for it, but I haven't seen a lot of action."

BOTH CANDIDATES said they favor an ethics code for the board of commissioners. Mrs. Moffitt voted for the proposal recently defeated by the board.

"I believe we should have a code of ethics for all county employees and officials, elected and appointed, and they should be held accountable for their activities," Mrs. Moffitt said.

"However, we must make certain we don't create a 'super sleuth agency' with no safeguards against irresponsible charges and politically motivated smears," Mrs. Moffitt added.

Mrs. Hirschberg said she would like to have all the details on a proposed ethics code before saying she favored it, "but I can't imagine myself opposing it unless grossly misdrawn."

MRS. MOFFITT has a bachelor of science degree in commerce from DePaul University in Chicago and did post graduate work at Wayne State University.

She was technical editor for the U.S. Department of the Army from 1949-53, and a teacher from 1960-64. She has been active in civic and Republican Party affairs for many years.

Mrs. Moffitt is a member of the American Association of University Women, Altrusa International, Project Hope, League of Women Voters and on the board of directors of the Oakland County volunteer bureau.

She is also a past president of the Bloomfield Republican Women's Club and former vice president of the Republican Women's Federation of Michigan and the Oakland County Council of Republican Women.

A resident of Bloomfield Township, she is married to Brent Moffitt and they are the parents of an adult son.

MRS. HIRSCHBERG lived in Southfield for six years before moving to Bloomfield Township a year and one-half ago. She has been active in the gubernatorial campaign of Democratic Sander Levin, serving as scheduler for Mrs. Levin.

Mrs. Hirschberg holds a bachelor of arts degree in political science from the University of Pennsylvania, and is a masters candidate in child development at Wayne State University.

While living in Southfield, she served as president and secretary of the Southfield Democratic Club, and is a member of the Oakland County Democratic committee.

Mrs. Hirschberg was appointed representative of the Gilbert Lake Protective Association and is a member of the political science honorary society.

SHE IS MARRIED to Gerald Hirschberg and they are the parents of two elementary school children.

Mrs. Moffitt and Mrs. Hirschberg were unopposed in their party primary elections in August.

Mrs. Hirschberg received 2,078 votes, with her primary block coming from Southfield. Mrs. Moffitt's total was 1,425.

Hills council challenges sewage rate

FARMINGTON HILLS—The city council Monday night challenged a request by the Oakland County Department of Public Works to raise sewage disposal rates for residents.

City manager George L. Majors and city clerk Floyd A. Cairns were asked to convey concern about the rate hike to the DPW.

"I'd like to have the facts and figures," said Councilman Robert A. McConnell.

"What is the total cost of the operation, what is being made up by other cities, and what is our share of the total cost? These are the questions I'd like to see answered," he said.

The petition by the Oakland County DPW asked for an increase of 25 cents for every 1,000 cubic feet of water consumed.

"This is a 32 per cent raise since Jan. 1. They really have us over a barrel," said Councilwoman Joan D. Dudley.

"If we refuse to adopt it (the rate), I don't know what the consequences are, but it might be fun to find out," said Mayor Frederick Lichtman.

The city council hopes to have a DPW representative explain the rate hike and its breakdown at a future council meeting.

Democrats plan breakfast
