
The short or "prepared" club bid is an original opening bid made with a three-card club suit.

In principle the suit should be at least Q X X. It is essential for responder to mention his four-card major suit in order to find the major suit "fit."

Bertha Margolis of Troy had almost the perfect short club bid. The hand was not strong enough for an opening one notrump, and the bid of one spade would show five cards. Also, the jack-10 was almost as good as a queen.

When restored, it will be put to use as Village office and police headquarters.

The acquisition of the Hunter's. Whip is now complete, but years of neglect by its prior owner has left the Village with a major restoration expense.

This building is included in a Historic District which has been placed on the national Register of Historic Places and therefore it is of utmost importance for the e-suit of the restoration to be considered a quality historic preservation project.

THE MANNER in which exterior work will be done will be subject to close examination by local citizens and also by state and national preservation agencies.
