Our Neighbors

A new milk ordinance has been adopted at Pontiac.

William Cocher, who came to this county in 1846, died at his home east of Pontiac Monday.

Large crowds attended the auction sale of the military academy equipment at Orchard Lake this week.

Holly's village council will pass a new ordinance, making lower license to be charged transient merchants in that village.

Plans for the Rochester home coming are about completed and a fine program has been arranged for the two days' festivities, July 29-30.

Mrs. Wilber White, aged 95 years and 25 days, passed away at her home in Southfield last week. She had always led an active life until a week before her death.

The Rapid Motor Vehicle company of Pontiac has increased the capital stock from \$250,000 to \$500,000. A total of \$150,000 will be spent in improvements. They expect to market 5,000 cars the coming season, five times the present output.

Thieves visited the farm of Adrian G. Barrett in Highland township Tuesday night. The next morning he found that his horse had been taken from the pasture and a buggy and harness had been stolen from the barn. The officers are at work on the case. The buggy was tracked into Livingston county.

The body of H. Lynn Sanders, aged 39 years, who escaped from the Eastern Michigan asylum on July 2, was found floating on Lake Oshtun Saturday morning. He is believed to have committed suicide. His parents reside in Ypsilanti and his father went to Pontiac and accompanied the remains to that place for burial.

Railroad Jack appeared in Pontiac Wednesday, dragging behind him a house on wheels in which he makes his home when out on the road. This house is a shack built on a wagon and is drawn by Jack himself, who grabs two heavy ropes attached to the front of the wagon in place of tujls, and takes it along with him wherever he goes. The house is fitted up with sleeping accommodations, and a gasoline stove for cooking.
