Do it yourself recycling replaces old papermobile

The papermobile that stood on the grounds of O.E. Dunckel Junior High School closed its doors this past weekend in exchange for the new recycling service that will pick up bound papers in front of resident's homes.

Sponsor of the papermobile was Earth Alive, an organization which had always hoped the operation would be temporary, made possible through the cooperation of the Farmington School District.

The papermobile did its job, averaging a collection of 18 tons of paper per month throughout 1974, and in addition, gave some financial support to the community groups who served there; Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, 4H clubs, Explorer and Blue Bird troops.

Other monies that were garnered from the papermobile were distributed to such as the Farmington Public Library for the purchase of books concerning ecology or the annual Seedling Swap.

The latest donation was given to the schools for the purchase of two color films on the environment and for use in environmental projects by teachers in the secondary level.

ON THE NEW paper recycling effort, Nancy Kourtjian, president of Earth Alive, said, "If everyone cooperates, our 12,000 families can put more than 60 tons of paper per week back into the resource pool instead of into fast-disappearing landfills.

"Even more important, 17 living

trees can be saved for each ton of paper recycled, over 1,000 trees a week."

Old newspapers, laid flat in a large brown paper bag and tied, may be placed out with the trash now and picked up separately by the disposal service contracted by the city.

"The (disposal) trucks each have a separate rack under the truck to carry these papers now and we want them to use it," Mrs. Kourtjian said.

Residents who believe their bundled papers are not being separated from the trash are asked to call reports of non-compliance to the GCW Disposal Service, 644-6647.
