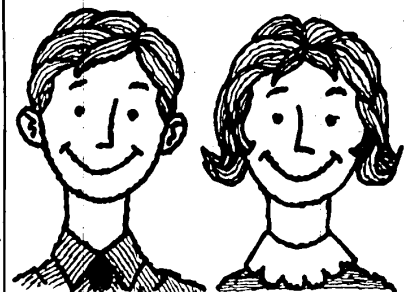

Spartans top Inter Lakes loop

Lavonia Stevenson clinched the 1975 championship of the Inter-Lakes Conference Friday with a 62-58 victory over a scrappy Farmington quintet that fought the champions down to the final whistle.

The win gave the Spartans a 9-1 league record and gave them the crown for the first time since 1970. They have a 15-5 season mark. For the Falcons it was the end of a 5-15 season with a 5-5 record in the conference.

After outplaying the host team in the first half, the Spartans had to fight for their life in the second half when the Falcons pulled within a point of tying the score with a minute to play.

That's when the Spartans got some excellent play from Jim Gilland who hit from the foul line and three times from the foul line to put the victory away.

STEVENSON opened an eight point edge in the opening canto, 18-10 and widened the gap to 25-17 at halftime.

The Spartans outscored the host club 18-17 in the third period and it appeared they were headed for a rather easy victory.

Then the Falcons caught fire, gradually slicing the deficit until only one point separated the teams, 57-56, with little more than a minute remaining.

That's when Gilland came through with his five points that made the difference.

"We were in charge all the way until the fourth quarter," explained Stevenson Coach George Van Wagoner who now takes his club into the district tournament at Stevenson Monday at 6:30 p.m. against Taylor Center.

Then Farmington started to hit from every angle and erased our lead to a single point. I was real proud of the way our boys came back for the

victory. This shows the spirit of a champion and that's what we are in the league."

Van Wagoner picked out George Herman for special mention as one of the big reasons for the triumph.

"George played a super game," said the coach. "He blocked at least six shots and contributed 10 points to our total score. It was his best game of the entire season."

Farmington makes its debut in tournament action Tuesday at 7 p.m. at Southfield when it clashes with Livonia Bentley.

Match Thomas was the top scorer for the Falcons with 17 points. Dave

Haberman and Bob Rose divided honors for Stevenson with 12 each.

Patriots drop Raiders, 44-36

Basketball games have been won by all types of finishes this year but none one on the board for Livonia Franklin for the most unusual fourth quarter of the season.

The Patriots ended their regular season and play in the Northwest Suburban League at North Farmington with a 44-36 victory.

That sounds normal enough. But can you imagine a team scoring 12 points in the final eight minutes, all from the foul line. That's what Franklin did outscoring the Raiders 12-11 to insure the victory.

Six of the free throws were by Joe Pollard who converted on eight of 11 for the evening and that's all the points he got.

Games between North and Franklin traditionally are battles all the way. In football, basketball or baseball and this contest wasn't different.

FRANKLIN WAS red hot in the first half, outscoring North, 11-6 in the first quarter and 10-7 in the second for a halftime lead of 21-13.

Then Coach Ken Dean regrouped his raiders during the intermission and it was a tight fight for the second half.

North outlived the Patriots in the third frame but only by a single point, 12-11. Then came the final quarter in

which the Raiders checked Franklin's scoring from the field but saw the Patriots collect the 12 free throws.

"It was a comedy of errors for us," said North Coach Dean. "It seemed as if each team was trying to out-fumble the other and we succeeded."

MIKE MORROW was the big gunner for North with four field goals and six of 11 free throws for 14 points.

"Our kids were really scrapping for this one," said Coach Bob Visser of Franklin. "We took the lead and then played close to the vest for the remainder of the evening. We only tried four shots from the floor in the final quarter."

North controlled the baskets with 37 rebounds to 32 for Franklin. The Livonians converted on 22 of 32 from the foul line and the Raiders made 14 of 28. Both clubs had 11 field goals.
