

Regan speaks at fundraiser

Ronald Reagan, former governor of California will speak at an April 26 fundraising reception and dinner for Dan Murphy, Oakland County Executive.

Between 750 and 800 tickets have been sold for the event, 250 of them at \$150 a person for both the reception at the Bloomfield Hills Country Club, and the dinner at the Raleigh House, and about 500 to 550 for the 775 dinner only ticket.

The committee chairman, Alan G. Loofbourrow, a vice-president of engineering at Chrysler, and his wife of Bloomfield Hills, said the theme of the fundraiser was "Get involved to help ensure good government."

The committee expects to raise around \$70,000 to retire a \$41,000 campaign debt from Murphy's 1974 election, and to provide a financial base for launching his re-election bid in 1978.

The reception will be held from 4:30 to 6:00 p.m.; the dinner will start at 7:30 p.m.

Adat Shalom slates camp

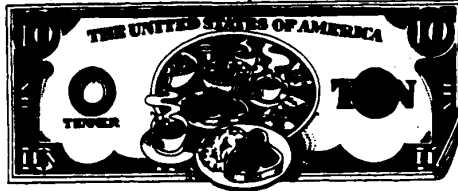
Camp Tel Shalom of the Adat Shalom Synagogue announces day camp for preschoolers.
