Lou Gordon should be careful

A good many of the sparks which flew at the Public Service Commission hearing on the Mich-igan Bell rate hike came from a powering gener-ator—television's Lou Gordon.

As promised on his Sunday evening television, show, he was at the hearing on the Orchard Ridge campus to challenge the company and its executives.

As the current run of jokes go,—there was some good news and some bad news. The good news is that Gordon's interest packed the house—an unusual occurrence at such hearings. His references to executives making \$40,000 a year or more were crowd-pleasers. He placed himself, in one of his subtle moments, on the side of the little guy contributing to those salaries. But Gordon isn't exactly your average blue collar worker. His yearly earnings, which he never mentioned, put him slightly above that level.

The question is not whether he is worth what he carns, but whether it is fair to pass himself off as just another average wage-earner. He isn't, although he plays the man-of-the-people role with

gusto.

Gordon is in a powerful position. It carries a tre-mendous responsibility. He wouldn't be the first to abuse the public trust.

HE WOULD be wise to clean up his act and drop lines like, "Democrats are generally, not always, more interested in people than profits."

He is certainly familiar with the old truism. Power corrupts and absolute power corrupts ab-

Question: What is a "magic mushroom?"
Answer: You are probably referring to the drug psilocybin which is derived from the "magic" mushrooms of Mexico and may be either extracted or synthesized. Psilocybin is a psychedelic drug which has initial stimulating effects, but is primarily a mind-active agent.

The chief effects of the drug in its pure form include mood alteration and changes in sensory perception. Real psilocybin, however, is rarely available. Most frequently the psilocybin on the street is a combination of PCP and LSD.

Answer: Yes. The organisms causing these diseases cannot live very long when exposed to

light and air away from warm, moist areas of the human body. Thus, there is little danger of becom-ing infected with syphilis or gonormea from pub-lic toilets, door knobs, drinking cups or eating

Question: How long does it take before a blood test can accurately detect syphilis?


Answer: The blood test for syphilis is called the VDRL. Although it is a good test, it has its ilimitations. It cannot give accurate results before the disease has been present for at least four to six works.

Even then 24 per cent of the persons with pri-mary syphilis have "false negative" results. The VDRL is 100 per cent accurate in cases which have reached the secondary stage of syphilis.

method, be sure you have a raised in-cense burner that does not rest flat on the table, shelf, or floor, because it can get very hot.

I like to place the charcoal (I use the one-inch, self-starting kind) in the soil in one of my large plant contain-ers. This is much safer, and there is no mess to clean up because the ashes blend nicely with the soil.

Take care to keep the hot coal far crough from the stems and leaves of the plant so that the heat causes it no damage, and you'll have no trouble. I've used this method for years, and up plants are still flourishis that in crystal form: It may be burned by itself, or in a special container, or sprinkled over the charcoal like the powdered form.
