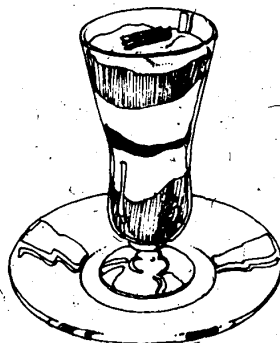
The couple will make their home in Charleston.

He was also a resident advisor and chemistry laboratory assistant, as well as a volunteer tutor for the local grade school.

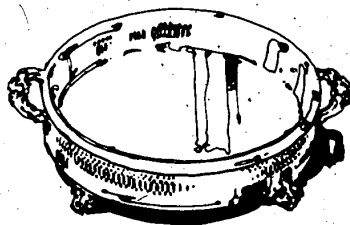


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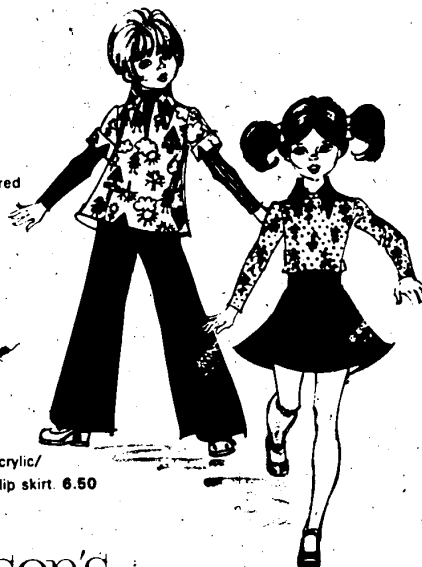
