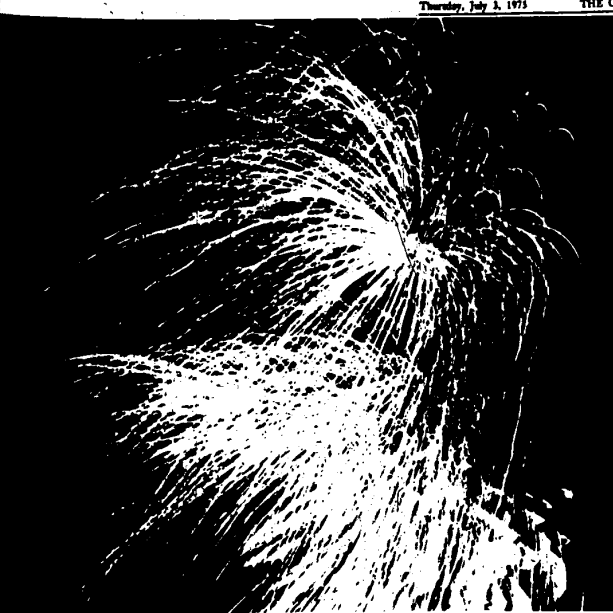

The bus chassis will be purchased from International Harvester Co. for \$7,819.



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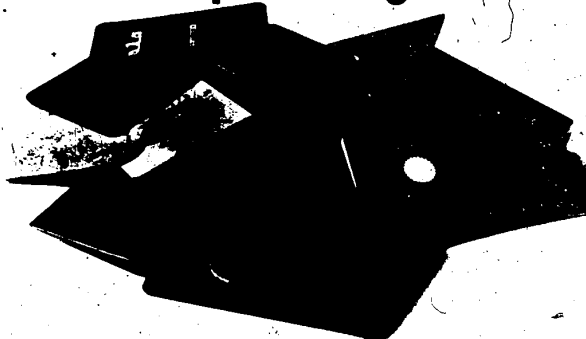

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CITY OF FARMINGTON COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS (Summary)

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington City Council was held Monday, June 16, 1975. The meeting was called to order at 8:00 p.m. by Mayor Yoder. Councilmen Alton Hartsock, Richardson, Tupper, Yoder were present. City Officials present were City Mgr. Deadman, Engr. Frank Papke, Director Jones, Atty. Kelly, L. Guilmette, Clerk Vane.

Minutes of previous meeting were approved. The Public Hearing was held on the paving of Brookdale Street. Comments were heard from residents of Brookdale Street.

Council adopted Res. No. 3 approving plans for 7' x 31 ft. width concrete with curb gutter and storm drainage on Brookdale Street from Grand River Avenue south to Nine Mile Road and directing the City Assessor to prepare a Special Assessment Roll.

Res. No. 4 establishing a Public Hearing to Review the Special Assessment Roll for July 31, 1975 at 8:00 p.m. was adopted. Minutes of other boards were received and filed.

A Public Hearing was established for July 7, 1975 at 8:00 p.m. to review the request of Mr. Norman Paudon to re-zone approximately 4.2 acres of land directly south of the Worldwide Shopping Center from R-1-C One Family Residential (Country Estates), to R-1-A One-Family District.

Permission granted to: Chatham Hills Subdivision Association to erect various temporary signs within the subdivision to advertise subdivision events, and a permanent decorative bulletin board to advertise activities of the Subdivision Control Board and other notices.

Farmington Founders Festival to use the Downtown Farmington Shopping Center parking area for Festival activities; Shawnee Street Park for "Sunday-in-the-Park" activities; conduct a Fireworks Display on the Lady of Sorrows Parking Lot; and conduct a Parade on Grand River as part of the Festival activities.

Farmington Racquet Club to continue use of a temporary sign until August 18, 1975.

Council was in favor of supporting action taken by the Twp. of Commerce regarding property tax relief and was in favor of supporting the theory of HB 4280 with certain modifications.

Letter from Michigan Municipal League regarding HB 5250/SB 400 was received and filed.

Council authorized City Mgr. to take bids for paving Brookdale Street from Grand River Avenue south to Nine Mile Road.

Council authorized Public Safety Dept. to proceed with their proposed program for residential fire safety to provide residents with fire safety equipment at reduced prices from normal retail cost.

The following Resolutions were adopted:

Supporting recommendations of the Water Rate Study Committee

Authorizing payment to contractors for work completed on the Municipal Building Expansion

Authorizing purchase of 500 Water Meters from the Badger Meter Co. at a cost of \$15,444.00 to be funded from the 1975-76 Water & Sewer Fund budget.

Authorizing the purchase of Radio Equipment from the Motorola Communications and Electronics, Inc. in the amount of \$8,690.00.

Authorizing the expenditure of \$33.39 for the continuation of the Saturation Patrol.
