### A FINE TRIP Was That Taken by the Eastern Michigan Press Club.

A most delightful outing was that taken by the members of the Eastern Mich. Press club and their guests last week on their trip to Sault Ste Marie, via the Georgian Bay and Thirty Thousand island. The party left Detroit Saturday afternoon, Sept. 4, on the steamer King Edward.

The only unpleasant feature of trip was the unkindness of the weather man in sending some rough weather, which necessitated the tying up of the steamer at Point Edward all day Sunday, and which later caused the most of the party to enjoy all the unpleasantness of seasickness. But notwithstanding all this, it was a very fine trip.

Stops were made at various places enroute and time was given the passengers to visit the places of interest and to attend moving picture shows, the latter being the delight of most editors.

Captain Wm. Bemrose of the King Edward also gave them a delightful little side trip through some of the most beautiful scenery of the Thirty Thousand Islands.

Arriving at the Canadian Soo Tuesday morning the locks were visited and as guests of T. J. Kennedy, general superintendent and traffic manager of the Algoma Central, the party was shown through the steel plant the wood pulp factory and various other places of interest. In the afternoon the American Soo claimed the party, visiting Fort Brady and the locks, shooting the rapids and sight-seeing through the city.

The return voyage was very pleasant, being favored with nice weather, and they arrived in Detroit Thursday in time to attend the state fair.

The committee on resolutions, Louis C. Crambee, Geo. T. Campbell and Fred M. Wilkinson, drafted the following resolutions which were adopted by the Eastern Mich.
