Most players avoid leading away from kings. For the average player

BRIDGE

It is a good rule of thumb. It takes expert analysis of the bidding to draw the inference at the right moment to attack with the suit of a king.

West led the 10 of spades. The fact that a lead has been avoided should serve to warn a shrewd declarer.

North's bidding left much to be desired. After South opened, North decided three spades was not a good decision. Certainly, he was too strong, but to force the action to six cannot be recommended.

Not unnaturally, West avoided leading from a king. A minor-suit lead would have made declarer's play easy.

Since the heart finesse had to succeed to give the contract a chance, South won in his hand and led the heart. This succeeded, so he came to his hand with a trump and took the deep diamond finesse to lose to the jack.

East continued the hearts and South ruffed dummy's last heart. Another low diamond was led and the 10 was successfully finessed.

If the diamonds divide, the contract is now made. Most declarer's tried this or previously had led toward South's queens.

The best line is to cash the club and play all the trumps. On the last trump West must either unguard the diamond or discard the club king.

If the club king does not appear, the queen is of no value and declarer leads toward the diamond ace. The diamond king may appear, either because the diamonds divide or because West has released a diamond to conceal the club king.
