

Harrison netters top city foe

Despite rumors to the contrary, Jodi Ross is back at Southfield High School winning girls' tennis matches this fall.

Miss Ross, who won the high school state singles championship last year as a junior, started her final season at Southfield in fine fashion by beating Southfield-Lathrup's Debbie Bush, 6-0, 6-1, in the annual cross-town battle last week on the Blue Jays' courts.

But her efforts weren't quite enough as Lathrup defeated Southfield, 4-3.

"She's still there and she's still tough as nails," said Lathrup coach Ed Walts. "One rumor was that she was in an accident, and she was. But she's still a very good player."

Another rumor had it that Jodi's family had moved to California.

In another cross-town meet, Farmington Harrison stopped Farmington High, 6-1. In No. 1 singles, Harrison's Janice Lukasiewicz defeated Sara Bentley, 6-1, 6-1. Farmington's only victory came in No. 4 singles where Jan Fournier beat Dana Vikner, 5-7, 6-3, 6-3.

Coch Bernie Golstein guided Harrison to the Western Six girls' tennis crown last year, and he's optimistic about the team's chances this season.

"We were 9-4 last year, and we're hoping to do even better this year," he said. "I think we have even better players this year."

In another meet last week, Grosse Pointe Star of the Sea defeated Farmington Our Lady of Mercy, 4-3.

Mercy's match victories came in No. 3 singles, where Betty Spreen stopped Dainor Sotiller, 4-6, 6-4, 6-2, and in No. 2 doubles, where the Hackett sisters—Beth and Patty—defeated Mimi Isbey and Mary Cohen, 6-1, 6-1.

"Last night (against Star of the Sea), it should have been an easy win for us," said Mercy coach Linda Barber. "Maybe our girls got a little too confident."

Earlier last week, Birmingham Marian defeated Mercy, 5-3. Mercy's Hackett sisters won their match, defeating Anne Armstrong and Katie Pulte, 10-5, in pro sets.

with Walled Lake Western, winning 7-0.

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Plymouth man wins O&E tourney

Plymouth's Dave Wall took control of the 1975 Observer & Eccentric Golf Tournament on the ninth hole of the second round and then never let up as he coasted to a two-stroke victory over Livonia's Bud Stevens in the annual event at Whispering Willows Golf Course.

Wall recorded rounds of 78 and 71 for a total of 147—and the two-stroke margin.

"The first day (Sept. 13) it was really windy and cold, and nobody shot that well," Wall said.

Indeed, the best round of that day was a 74 recorded by Tom Ahern, who finished with an 80 for 154 and third place in the tournament.

"It was comparable to the British Open," said host pro Gary Whitener of the miserable weather which greeted a record turnout of 165 golfers. Temperatures were in the low 40s and winds were gusting to 25 miles per hour as the first golfers teed off.

The following day brought fair weather and, in the end, an exciting finish to the tournament.

Wall grabbed the one-stroke lead from Stevens, who was runner up last year also, on the ninth hole and then sank a long putt for par on the 14th. Stevens went one par on that hole.

Wall bogged the last hole, but Stevens' long chip shot from just off the green was just off the mark and he, too, ended up with a bogey.
