Schools will have filmstrip program

Knowing the news will be the focus of a project which will be undertaken by elementary and secondary schools in the Farmington School District.

The program is sponsored by the Detroit News and offered only to the Farmington schools in filmstrip packages. News through Friday night will be captionized, then organized and presented to the schools in filmstrips and guides.

The 10 monthly filmstrips will become the property of the schools and are designed to be used with weekly discussion guides published for each grade level.

Semester exams, included in the program, will feature complete filmstrip examinations and will be supplemented by weekly news quizzes.

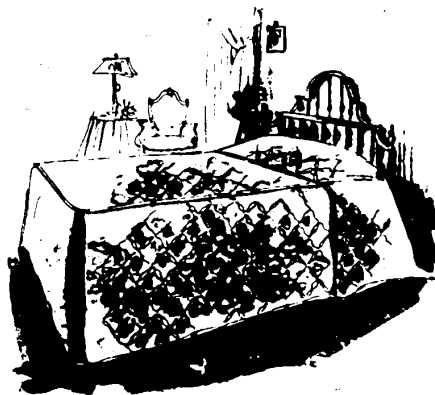
WAGON CLUB meets at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 14 in Farmington Public Library, 32727 Twelve Mile Road.

Crafts people sample Utopia

Birmingham artist Peter Ruhf was among 40 craftspeople sponsored by the Haystack Mountain School of Crafts to take part in a pioneering crafts project at Arcosanti, visionary architect Paolo Soleri's utopian community now under construction in the Arizona desert.

The craftspeople set up kilns, metal and weaving studios, becoming the first, though temporary, residents of Arcosanti.

Ruhf, who worked in ceramics during his weeks in Soleri's city, said Arcosanti is being constructed around Soleri's philosophy of "arceology" (architecture and ecology) plus ecological communities or cities.

"Soleri believes in mind over matter, that in a desert community there is something spiritually to be gained," Ruhf said. "People

can work in construction, arts or crafts and have tools and plenty of time to do it. Even living in central Arizona which is very primeval, is an expanding experience. It's a kind of an ideal spot for an artist, with all the colors and the big open spaces."

THE CRAFTSPEOPLE were able to keep most of the things they made in Arcosanti, Ruhf said, although some contributions were made to the community. For example those, like Ruhf, who worked in the ceramics studio, made a set of cups and plates for the city.

After completing this project, Ruhf went on to experiment with salt firing, a ceramics process in which rock salt is tossed into the kiln during firing, resulting in an orange peel or granite-like effect

Plain meals turn fancy with herbs and spices

One of the easiest—and most inexpensive—ways to make a plain meal fancy is to season it with herbs and spices. If you know how to store and use them, herbs and spices can enhance the natural flavor of almost all foods—and all meals.

You can learn the basics of seasoning with herbs and spices in a fact sheet from the Department of Agriculture "Seasoning with Herbs and

Spices" is available free from Consumer Information, Dept. 43, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

The fact sheet suggests that when you buy spices and herbs, you buy in small amounts—they lose pungency and flavor fairly rapidly in storage. To keep flavor loss at a minimum, herbs and spices should be stored in a cool, dry place in air-tight containers. That way, they will retain flavor and color for around six months. Whole spices, though, keep almost indefinitely.

Whole spices taste best in slow cooked dishes, so that long simmering can release their full flavor and aroma. But the flavor of ground spices is released immediately—they may be added about 15 minutes before the end of the cooking period. Crumble whole or leaf herbs just before you use them to let out more flavor.

If you're not following a recipe, start out with 1/4 teaspoon of spice per pound of meat or pint of sauce and increase as desired. When using red pepper or garlic powder, begin with only 1/8 of a teaspoon.

AMONG THE 39 spices and herbs listed in the fact sheet are:

Allspice: used in pot roast, fish, eggs, pickles, sweet potatoes, squash and fruit.

Dill Seed: Good for pickles, pickled beets, salads, sauerkraut, green beans, stews, fish, chicken, bratards, and eggs.

Mace: Delicious in baked products, fruits, meatloaf, fish, poultry, chowder, vegetables, jellies and pickles.

Tarragon: Try in sour cream sauces, casseroles, marinades, pot roasts, veal, lamb, poultry, fish and egg dishes.
