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The craftspeople set up kilns, metal and weaving studios, becoming the first, though temporary, residents of Arcosanti.

Ruhf, who worked in ceramics during his weeks in Soleri's city, said Arcosanti is being constructed around Soleri's philosophy of "arcology" (architecture and ecol-ogy) plus ecological communities or cities.

"Soleri believes in mind over matter, that in a desert commu-nity there is something spiritually to be gained," Ruhf said. "People

THE CRAFTSPEOPLE were able to keep most of the things they made in Arcosanti, Ruhf said, although some contributions were made to the community. For example those, like Ruhf, who worked in the ceramics studio, made a set of cups and plates for the city.

After completing this project, Ruhf went on to experiment with salt firing, a ceramics process in which rock salt is tossed into the kiln during firing, resulting in an orange peel or granite-like effect


Arcosanti is also funded by grants from the Ford Foundation and from Xerox, as is Soleri's other arcological city outside Tueson.

RUHF, WHO is a painter and printmaker besides working in ceramics, said that at Arcosanti there was "a very wonderful exchange of knowledge and skills among the artists, also the sharing of the struggling community."

However he added, "At this time I don't think I could commit myself as a full-time person in the community, but I would like to go back and participate in another crafts project."

In the coming months, Ruhf plans to trade utopia for a farm in the Pennsylvania Dutch region where again he will take up painting and wait for the spring appearance of a book on boomerangs which his uncle wrote and he illustrated.

The fact sheel suggests that when you buy spices and herbs, you buy in small amounts—they lone purgency and flavor lairly rapidly in storage. To keep flavor loss at a minimum herbs and spices should be stored in a cool, dry place in all-tuphs containers. That way, they sill retain flavor and color for around six months. Whole spices, though, keep almost indefinitely

Whole spices laste best in slow cooked dishes, so that long summering can release their full flavor and aroma But the flavor of good spices is released immediately—they may be added about 15 minutes before the end of the cooking period Cramble whole or leaf herba just before you use them to let out more flavor.

If you're not following a recipe, start out with 't teaspoon of spice per pound of meat or pint of sauce and increase as desired. When using red pepper or garlic powder, begin with only 's of a teaspoon.

Allspice used in pot roast, fish, aggs, pickles, sweet potatoes, squash and fruit

Dill Seed. Good for pickles, pickled beets, salads, sauerkraut, green brans, stews, fish, chicken, breads, ard eggs.

Mace Delicious in baked products fruits, meatloaf, fish, poultry, chow der, vegetables, jellies and pickles

Tarragon: Try in sour cream sauces, casseroles, marinades, pot roasts, veal, lamb, poultry, fish and egg dishes
