

Artists' homes must

The multi-dimensional American home is unique in its variety. Since the earliest settlers set up housekeeping in their new land, the American home has been a conglomerate of ideas, some native, but many imported.

Now, as then, the American home must serve many purposes. We develop our homes around our varied lifestyles. We live in apartments, single family homes, mobile homes, duplexes, flats and townhouses. All these dwellings are as individual as the people who live in them and large or small they reflect their inhabitants lifestyles.

Dependence on imported goods and ideas has continued to this day.

But it appears more and more that we are granting credence to our own lifestyles, which differ markedly from those in Europe the place from which we have traditionally borrowed so many ideas for our homes

The imported ideas were adapted to new use in the colonies, so why not now as well?

Climatic conditions had a lot to do with what was done in colonial days as far as the inside of the home Today we do not have to consider so many of those factors because our homes are mechanically conditioned to weather changes

But then, furniture finishes, for instance, and the availability of natural wood sources had more to do with how the furniture looked than almost anything

In the South, the availability of hardwoods gave rise to the elegant styles and finishes which abounded in that region Farther north, pines were plentiful and much pine furniture was made there, accordingly

Also, in towns like Charleston, there was a decided elite class which could afford to maintain homes filled with fine-finished furniture and elegant silken drapes used on windows There were not the intense climatic conditions of New England to contend with, either

Philadelphia, New York and Boston were the stomping grounds of the North's equivalent to Southern elegant gentry and there homes were filled with the finest imported and Made in America turnishings from cabintery to tex-

America's furnishings still tend to be made here as they were hundreds of years ago
