to get into long-range planning program for five years and one for 10. We will have to be forward-looking enough when the time comes to make this merger a merger of smoothness by joining on a basis of a section at a time. It shouldn't be an all-consuming type of thing, all at once. It should allow progressive, meaningful consolidation."

Consolidation, he said, is inevitable. A continuing city concern is the economic restoration of businesses on the north side of Grand River. Moore thinks parking area may be the answer but not at the sacrifice of the historical district homes on the south side of Oakland Street.

"There is a long-standing feeling in today's society that in order to make anything successful, you have to make it an easy-access parking is one of the facilities."

"I personally don't think we have to use these homes right now and tear them down for parking," he said. Instead, he suggested razing a building near Farmington Junior High School which had housed a pool business.

"To me that whole structure is an eyesore. Historically, we have a very fine background (in the homes on Oakland). I don't think we have to get in and touch those homes to start on a program of upgrading the parking." Moore has no gripe with the present city council, but says, "I think that new blood is always helpful."

"I THINK I could bring fresh thoughts and ideas from other cities with the extensive traveling that I have done," he said.

His job requires much travel, but he doesn't expect it to interfere with a city council position.

"I'm in the Detroit office more. I accepted the position on the Planning Commission as a kind of experiment to see if it would be a problem. I think my attendance record will show that it wasn't. I attended all but one meeting in the two terms. I have held this post."

Moore would like to see more lighting about the streetside-of Farmington. He would also like to have an access to 196 from Freedom Road.

"It would be more or less a complete modification of what we have now. I would want it to come to the west side of Farmington Road."

He also wants more citizen involvement.

"I would like to see more citizen involvement. It's bound to help everyone. It will give the council direction and help the citizenry."

Moore was a treasurer and director of the Greater Detroit Society for the Blind and is a professional member of the American Society of Safety Engineers.
