

# Hawks reign in local golf

Farmington Harrison's golf team finished its best season ever by capturing the city championship last week in a three-way, 18-hole match with North Farmington and Farmington High after the Hawks had placed 15th in the state championships Saturday.

Harrison's five-man team of Jim Smith (71), Will Murphy (78), Mike Tobin (79), Tom Erickson (80) and Chris Kallgren (82) posted a team total of 397 in touring the par-71 Farmington Country Club layout against the Raiders and Falcons.

North Farmington was 40 strokes back at 437, with FHS third at 438. In the years that the three-team intra-city match has been held, the best previous winning team total was an even 400 registered by North Farmington in 1973.

Individual scores turned in Monday included these figures for the North and FHS linksmen:

North: Craig Lazar, 81; Brian Terhaar, 85; Pat Day, 95; Bob Kraus, 89; and Mike Neis, 95.

Farmington High: Ken Medelis, 81; Mark Sheedio, 86; Craig West, 87; Mike Sutton, 88; and Tom Van Cleave, 99.

In closing the books on the 1975 campaign, Harrison could point to such accomplishments as placing third in the state regional meet, third in the Western Six, a team triumph in the Oakland County tournament and a 194 record in dual competition.

Not only did the third place finish in the regionals give the Hawks the distinction of being the only team from the immediate area that qualified for the state championships, but in the person of Smith the Hawks also had the regional medalist.

Coach Bill Spencer pointed out that his four top players had a competitive nine-hole scoring average for the season ranging from 40 to 42, and admitted, "That sure will be hard to beat next season."

The 18-hole state finals were played on Michigan State University's Forest Acres course and scores of all 21 teams soared in the face of atrocious cold, windy, rainy weather.

The medalist was Utica Eisenhower's Dale Robb, who shot a remarkable 79 under two overcasts, while Kalamazoo Loy Norris captured the Class A team title with a four-man score of 325.

"Loy Norris performed unbelievably well. They had to be good to average 81 and a fraction per man in that lousy weather," said Spencer.

Smith, who held the role as No. 1 man for the Hawks all season, turned in an 85 at East Lansing, with Erickson scoring 86. Tobin shot a 85, and Murphy may dream for years about his even 100.

"The weather wasn't any worse for one team than it was for another," said Spencer, "but it sure wasn't a day when golf was the fun game it should be."

Harrison's team total was 398 which left the Hawks knotted for 15th place in the standings with Livonia Franklin. In front of the Harrison foursome were these teams:

Kalamazoo Loy Norris, 325; Grosse Pointe North, 336; Birmingham Groves, Northville and Bloomfield Hills Andover, 340; Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills, 343; Waterford West and Rochester Adams, 346; Dearborn Fordson, 348; Utica Eisenhower, 349; Dearborn High and Flushing, 351; Walled Lake Central and Lansing Waverly, 354.

If there was one major disappointment for the Hawks, it was not finishing ahead of Western Six rivals Northville and Waterford Mott. Those were the only two teams that beat Harrison in dual matches and in the league meet all season long.

Next Saturday the Raiders will have a home date against the deflated Hawks of Harrison, whose bid for a second straight Western Six championship went glimmering in a 23-10 loss to Livonia Churchill.

After that one, North will invade the lair of Farmington High where the Falcons are riding high in possession of their first piece of the Inter-Lakes League crown in 17 years. That battle is scheduled for Saturday afternoon, Nov. 8.
